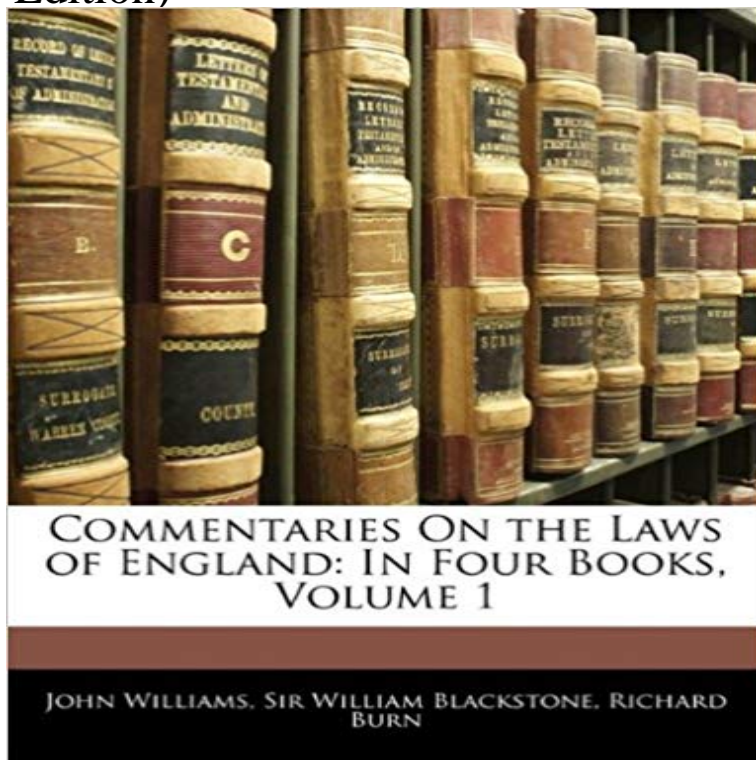


Commentaries On the Laws of England: In Four Books, Volume 1 (Latin Edition)
